# CONTROLLING CANCER: TEXANS TOGETHER



Tools for Texans: Helping
Communities Fight Cancer is a
workshop for community stakeholders,
healthcare professionals, cancer
survivors, volunteers, and anyone who
wants to work towards fighting cancer in
the community. Participants will enhance
their capacity to implement cancer
prevention and control programs in
communities throughout the state.

The program was developed to help Texans work together toward the goals of a) tobacco use prevention and cessation, b) improving nutrition and increasing physical activity to reduce the incidence of obesity, and c) increasing the use of screening and early detection services.

Participants acquire tools necessary for developing a plan, using cancer statistics, planning meetings, media and outreach, finding resources, working with priority populations, locating funding, influencing public policy, and evaluating efforts. This is not a CNE offering, but an opportunity for networking and skill-building. The theme of the event is *Get Organized, Get Connected, and Make a Difference*. By working together, we CAN control cancer in Texas.

IN TEXAS, AS IN THE NATION, THE GROWING NUMBER OF OLDER ADULTS WILL INCREASE THE NUMBER OF PEOPLE AFFECTED BY CANCER AND MAKE PRESENT-DAY PREVENTION MORE IMPERATIVE.







Although the decrease in overall cancer incidence and death rates is encouraging, rising incidence and mortality for some cancers are of concern (American Cancer Society, 2009).

## NEW REPORT: THE STATUS OF CANCER

The Annual Report to the Nation on the Status of Cancer, published in the January issue of Cancer, reveals that incidence and mortality rates for all cancers combined are decreasing for both men and women. From 1999-2006, incidence rates for all cancers combined decreased 0.7 percent per year for both men and women. Death rates decreased 1.6 percent per year from 2002-2006.

#### SIGNIFICANT FINDINGS

- The three most common cancers in men - lung, prostate, and colorectal cancer - declined in both incidence and mortality.
- Lung cancer incidence and mortality decreased for men of all races/ethnicities but the rates did not change for women.
- Breast cancer incidence and mortality decreased for women of all races and ethnicities combined.
- Long-term incidence trends for colorectal cancer have been fairly consistent in men and women.
- Colorectal cancer death rates have declined since 1984 in both genders, with an accelerated rate of decline since 2002 for men and 2001 for women.

The report found that declines in colorectal cancer death rates are consistent with a relatively large contribution from screening, with a smaller but demonstrable impact of risk factor reductions and improved treatments. With favorable trends in risk factors, higher utilization of screening, and optimal treatment, these rates could be accelerated further. Certainly, nurses are in a position to positively influence rates of screening, as well as other factors that may lower incidence of many cancers.

#### **GET THE WHOLE STORY**

Scientists at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), American Cancer Society (ACS), the National Cancer Institute (NCI), and the North American Association of Central Cancer Registries (NAACCR) collaborate to conduct this annual study.
